Understanding the Times

and Knowing What to Do

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Tucked away in the middle of 1 Chronicles is a remarkable comment about an otherwise little-mentioned tribe of Israel: '. . . from Issachar, men who understood the times and knew what Israel should do – 200 chiefs with all their relatives . . .' (12:32).



The nation was in transition as the despotic reign of Saul was giving way to David. From each of the tribes, large numbers in their thousands were rallying around the new king. Yet, Issachar catches the Chronicler's attention because they made a unique contribution: just 200 leaders who were astute about current realities and knew exactly how Israel should respond.

We are just weeks away from the first anniversary of the shocking Easter attacks of 2019. The painful memories and effects of that unprecedented violence against the Church are still raw and palpable. Few, though, have paused to ask the bigger question: How was it possible for extremely religious young people to even imagine that the unprovoked massacre of 257 men, women, and children would signify their great devotion to God?

Just a few weeks ago, a clergyman of a dominant religious community was filmed verbally abusing and slapping a Christian man for coming to the Eastern province to distribute gospel literature. Although at a different time in history the evidence of such a blatant act of violence and impunity would have drawn universal condemnation, not so now. The discussion on social media quickly diverted to whether it is right and permissible for Christians to share their experience of Jesus with other people. Right-wing religious groups in India are touting this infamous slapping incident as a model lesson from Sri Lanka for how Indians must respond to Christian evangelism! How are we to understand this disturbing trend in South Asia?

Australia has been on fire since September 2019. In addition to the charring of a land mass the size of Belgium or Hawaii and people dying, it is estimated that nearly one billion animals have been killed. As I write, earth's lungs are being incinerated as multiple fires rage in the Amazon and huge swathes of the tropical rain forests of Indonesia are slashed and burned: these to help bolster profits of a handful of companies growing soya bean and oil palms. How is such reckless greed even conceivable?



What is the Christian faith? What beliefs unify all Christians across denominations? Why did the Apostles consistently speak out against 'false teachings'? How do false teachers affect the Church? These questions are by no means trivial.

The Sri Lankan Church is facing particular and, in some ways, novel challenges. The growing influence of cult-like movements and heterodox teachings on the Church, in general, alongside rapid modernisation and cultural shifts, require a coherent Christian response.

This response must be contextual, unifying, and unambiguously Christian. In other words, we must approach afresh the charge given in Jude 1:3 - 'Dear friends, although I was very eager to write to you about the salvation we share, I felt compelled to write and urge you to contend for the faith that was once for all entrusted to God's holy people'.

'The Faith Entrusted Theology Conference' has been organised for the benefit of the Sri Lankan Church. The main goal is to explore how we understand the faith and what it means to be faithful to it. The conference is for reflective Christians, including pastors, theologians, ministry leaders, and students.

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Negombo Awards Ceremony

The first Awards Ceremony of the Negombo Study Centre was held on 8th February 2020, at the Kurana Methodist Church. Fourteen men and women were awarded the Certificate in Christian Studies, and a further fourteen were recognised for having completed Stage 1 of the programme.

And, then, there is the plastic. No one saw it coming because we were busy, for years, ensuring nuclear non-proliferation. What we needed was a 'plastic non-proliferation treaty' that would have prevented us from now collectively dumping eight million tons into our oceans every year. In addition to the obvious havoc plastic pollution wreaks on the environment, there is the unquantifiable harm caused by microplastics, and now nanoplastics. A recent study concluded that by the time a person reaches seventy they would have ingested two four-foot garbage bins of micro-plastics as part of their diet.

What will Christian responsibility look like? These and the other novel challenges of the twenty-first century could well be the final gasps of a world fatally wounded by human wickedness. Thank God, He has planned a 'new heavens and a new earth' when the old order passes away. In the meantime, how will the Church respond to this period of transition from the old to the new? Will she go beyond mere numbers and pray for disciples with the Issacharspirit: leaders who understand the times and know exactly what we should be doing?

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Mano Emmanuel: Outgoing Academic Ravin Caldera: Dean Takes on New Role

Mano joined CTS in 2001 as Accountant cum Lecturer, soon after graduating with an MA in Aspects of Biblical Interpretation from the London School of Theology. Prior to this, she had qualified in the UK as a Chartered Accountant and completed seven-years as an Audit Senior at a firm of Chartered Accountants in the UK. She took to teaching as a 'natural' and, within a short period, her giftedness and development as a lecturer saw her entrusted with the role of Academic Coordinator.



Four years on, Mano was appointed Academic Dean. One of the very few female Academic Deans in the world at the time, she distinguished herself in that role. Under Mano's care, CTS has come to be recognised as a model and innovative seminary in its ability to run over 250 courses conducted by some seventy lecturers, under five levels of programmes.

In December 2019, Mano was felicitated on the completion of her 14-years as Academic Dean at CTS. We congratulate her on her exceptional and exemplary service!

Ravin is one of the few people to have witnessed the transition of the seminary from CTS' predecessor -Impetus Institute - to Colombo Theological Seminary, in 1994.

From the onset, it was clear that Ravin possessed an unusual passion for books and study. In 2003, as he prepared for graduation, Ravin was invited to join the CTS Team as a Graduate Assistant, in preparation to becoming a faculty member. A dedicated lecturer, his two years as a Master of Biblical Studies student at Dallas Theological Seminary (USA) provided Ravin with an even higher level of competence as an academic. His thirst of learning saw him enrolling at the Open University for a degree programme in Sociology, which he completed with a first class, in 2019. A person of immense versatility, teaching the full range of the theological curriculum Ravin is always involved in multiple projects such as translations, writing of manuals, drawing maps, or assisting CTS' Research Professor. In 2006, Ravin helped CTS to pioneer the Rajarata Extension, and served as its first Coordinator. His passion to create excellent systems for academic work sees Ravin use his superior ability with software to good effect.

Ravin was appointed Assistant Academic Dean in 2013 and distinguished himself in that role by providing strong support to the Academic Dean, and by being an encouraging leader to the rest of the faculty. We congratulate Ravin on his new appointment and ask for your prayers for him.
