ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- A minimum of a bachelors-level qualification
- Fluency in English (spoken and written)
- Active Involvement in a local church*
- Successful completion of the 'Counselling Foundations' course
- Completion of the programme application process including submission of references and participating in an interview

*Important: Those registering for a CTS course for the first time must submit a letter of recommendation from your pastor.

PROGRAMME REQUIREMENTS

THOSE WITH A THEOLOGY DEGREE

Those who hold an accredited theology degree are required to complete:

• 30 MA credits

10 MA courses of 3 credits each = 8 core + 2 elective

• 2 Internships

These consist of experiential learning through counselling in church and community settings, supervision, case presentations and reflection, observation in clinical and other settings, and additional learning in areas of interest through digital and reading resources. The focus is to help you develop in the application of counselling skills, and in competencies and characteristics necessary for ethical and professional practice.



He was employed (part time) for 12 years by the Department of Social Welfare in Napier working with troubled youth, and with his wife Therese, has been a foster parent for 35 years. He was the founding Director of Camp David Trust for 10 years, a ministry to children and youth in Hawkes Bay (NZ). In 1994, David established Kidsreach, a ministry to children and to those who minister to children. He has written more than 60 books and manuals including *Kids in Crisis*, Child Abuse in the Church, Empowering Children, Strategies to Deal with Bullying, At the Foot of the Cross, Parables for Counselling, and Lost in Transition – or Not? David has a Masters in Ministry, Diploma of Counselling, and Certificate 4 in Adult Workplace Training. His doctorate in Cultural Contextualisation looks at the cultural and theological appropriateness of a counsellor training programme as taught in Alotau, Line Bay, Papua New Guinea. He presently serves as the International Director of Kidsreach. David is an ordained pastor with the CRC International Church.

A Doctor of Philosophy in Counselor Education and Supervision from the University of the Cumberlands (USA) Reupah also holds a Master of Science in Psychology, Master of Arts in Christian Studies, and Bachelor of Arts in Education from Indian universities. She is the founder of Meadows of Hope, a centre for emotional wellness, in India, that offers counselling, supervision, coaching, training, and research in the field of emotional and mental healthcare. She teaches as an adjunct faculty member in many colleges and institutions on the subjects of counselling skills, marriage and family therapy, counselling theories, crisis counselling, transaction analysis, multicultural counselling, supervision models, multicultural supervision, and, Christian counselling framework.

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APPLICATION PROCEDURE

STEP 1

Meet with the MA Programme Coordinator.

STEP 3

Hand in the completed programme application before your second MA course. STEP 2

Register for and complete the 'Counselling Foundations' course.

STEP 4

Attend an interview.

This course is designed to ensure you have a firm foundation in counselling skills. It will cover topics such as understanding the person of the counselor, developing the therapeutic relationship, observing and using nonverbal communication, establishing goals, understanding the process of growth, and appropriately using empathy, authenticity, immediacy and confrontation. It will integrate biblical and theological reflection with current counselling practice. It will also give you guidance on recognising explicit and implicit spiritual concerns being presented by those you counsel.

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OUNSELLING FOUNDATIONS


This course is a multidisciplinary study of human and faith development. It will examine all ages and stages of the human lifespan, focusing on problems associated with each stage and their practical significance in counselling. You will learn the developmental needs and issues in transitions between different stages in the human life cycle and appropriate counselling interventions for aiding people towards wholeness through accomplishing developmental tasks associated with each stage.



HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND NSELLING

Counselling Theories and Techniques I and II provide foundational theoretical concepts in individual counselling, an understanding of common mental health issues seen in counselling practice, and the use of suitable techniques drawn from different counselling modalities or theoretical perspectives. A survey of the major counselling theories and how each relates to biblical and theological perspectives will be presented.


This course will have a particular focus on Cognitive Behavioural Therapy, Rational Emotive Behaviour Therapy, Brief Solution Focused Therapy, and Emotion Focused Therapy.



UNSELLING THEORIES AND TECHNIQUES


Counselling Theories and Techniques I and II provide foundational theoretical concepts in individual counselling, an understanding of common mental health issues seen in counselling practice, and the use of suitable techniques drawn from different counselling modalities or theoretical perspectives. A survey of the major counselling theories and how each relates to biblical and theological perspectives will be presented.

This course will provide focused teaching on the principles and application of Narrative Therapy, Acceptance and Commitment Therapy, Dialectical Behaviour Therapy and on developing an integrative approach to counselling that is spiritually sensitive. You will develop your personal model of counselling based on learning from both courses and will apply the theories and techniques learned to common mental health issues seen in counselling.



UNSELLING THEORIES AND TECHNIQUES

This course presents foundational knowledge of relationship dynamics, assessment, and skills related to working with couples. The Christian view of the nature of marriage and family will be presented and you will learn theoretical approaches to marital counselling with an emphasis on a systemic perspective, as well as the application of practical evaluation and treatment tools, with a multicultural focus.




COUPLE THERAPY

This course is designed to prepare students to become ethical and effective multicultural counsellors. It emphasizes multicultural framework to develop competency in multicultural counselling; as well as knowledge and critical reflection to develop multiculturally-informed case conceptualizations and assessments. More generally, this course promotes the development of a broad mindset regarding culture, ethnicity, nationality, age, gender, sexual orientation, mental and physical characteristics, education, socioeconomic status, and religious and spiritual values that will lead to profound respect for the unique characteristics of individuals, couples, families, ethnic groups, and other communities. It also examines the principles and guidelines for professional counselling in general with application to ethical dilemmas and the application of professional ethics within society, the church and Christian community.



MULTI-CULTURAL COUNSELLING AND PROFESSIONAL ETHICS

This course equips students with an understanding of the impact of trauma on the whole person, families and communities. Students will learn symptoms and counselling approaches in treating trauma survivors. Counselling survivors of domestic violence, child sexual abuse, early childhood neglect, and complex trauma will be addressed along with suitable interventions after a crisis event. The spiritual impact of trauma and suitable responses will be integrated throughout the course.



TRAUMA AND CRISIS COUNSELLING

This course introduces students to the symptoms, causes and treatment of common mental disorders, abnormal behaviour and personality disorders. Students are introduced to the classification of mental disorders in the most current DSM/ICD and in the assessment of psychological and spiritual functioning.
